hich famous area actor at one time worked as a stagehand at WQED-TV?


Michael Keaton. Keaton was born in Coraopolis, PA and graduated from Montour High School in 1969. He did his stagehand work without a mask or cape.

The dinosaur's name is "Dippy" and he is patterned after Diplodocus Carnegii. Dippy is 85 feet in length and 18 feet high. Carnegie paleontologists found this specimen first. Its replica is now in museums all over the world, especially in Europe. Andrew Carnegie gave the first replica to the King of England in 1905, already put together, too. The rather oddly costumed small model of a Tyrannosaurus Rex nearby is the result of a local fundraiser.

hat was the name of the barge owned by the American Wind Symphony that sailed on Pittsburgh's waterways and docked to play symphonic music at local river towns?

Point Counterpoint II. The vessel sailed over 400,000 miles at an average speed of 6 mph, even going as far as Saint Petersburg, Russia. It went into dry-dock in 1996.


Only One! September 14, 1964. They performed at the Civic Arena.

What is its name?

Kentuck Knob. This less well-known Wright home was completed in 1956 for the I. N. Hagan family, Uniontown ice cream manufacturers. Kentuck Knob is now owned by Londoner Lord Peter Palumbo and is open to the public.







The place has 20 restored molds used to make steel at USX's Duquesne Works. The molds represent the three rivers. Four panels on the piece simulate the quadrants of Market Square. Christopher Siefert and Yaming Di, graduates of CMU's art school, designed the mural. It was financed by various local foundations, corporations, and private sources.

Andrew W. Mellon, and his children, Alisa Mellon Bruce, and Paul Mellon. They are considered founding benefactors.



ennessee Williams is gone, but where can you evoke his memory by riding A Streetcar Named Desire?

At the Pennsylvania Trolley Museum in Washington, PA. In 1964, the museum bought the trolley from the City of New Orleans for one dollar when it became available. One reason it's here is because New Orleans and Pittsburgh are the only two cities in the U.S. that have a track gauge of five feet two and a half inches. (The gauge is the distance between the rails). New Orleans stopped running the Desire in 1948.

The Gayety Theater staged live vaudeville and "refined burlesque" productions. The building became a movie theater, the Fulton, in 1930. The Byham opened in 1995.



oes Harry Potter have a Pittsburgh area ancestor?

With a little imagination the answer is yes. The Harry Potter series is published in the United States by Scholastic. On October 22, 1920 M. R. "Robbie" Robinson started the Scholastic Publishing Company in his hometown of Wilkinsburg, Pennsylvania. Today the company, now in New York and headed by the founder's son, has sales of over \$2 billion and publishes over 35 classroom magazines with a circulation of about 35 million students in grades K-12, plus 40 million parents.

hich Pittsburgh-born author received the Pulitzer Prize for Biography in 1993?

David McCullough. It was for Truman. McCullough also received a Pulitzer in 2002 for John Adams.

••• MOVIES Ctor Paul Newman starred in a 1970s film about hockey, part of which was filmed in nearby Johnstown.

What was the name of the film?

Slap Shot. In the movie, the town was called Charleston.

n what 1942 movie do both John Wayne and Randolph Scott fall in love with Marlene Dietrich?

Pittsburgh. In the movie, Wayne's nickname is "Pittsburgh." After Wayne ditches his bride-to-be on the night of the wedding and tries to rekindle an affair with Dietrich, she slaps him in the face.



How many free libraries did Andrew Carnegie donate to the world?


2,509. He donated \$56,162,622 for construction of the libraries, but nothing for their upkeep.

hat is the diameter of Kaufmann's clock? When was it built?

The bronze timepiece is six feet in diameter and was built around 1888. The Kaufmann brothers moved into the present location at Smithfield Street and Fifth Avenue in 1878. The structure at that location was built in 1913. Federated Department stores brought Kaufmann's in 2005; it is being re-vamped as Macv's.

hat is downtown's tallest building?

The USX Tower. It is 841 feet high.

MONEY

ow much money did Allegheny County organizations receive from the National Endowment for the Arts in 2006?

\$193,000. The money went to nine different groups: The Mattress Factory (\$50,000), Children's Museum of Pittsburgh (\$38,000), Pittsburgh Opera (\$35,000), Pittsburgh Ballet Theater (\$10,000), Pittsburgh Dance Alloy (\$10,000), Pittsburgh International Children's Theater and Festival (\$10,000), Pittsburgh Cultural Trust (\$15,000), Squonk Opera (\$20,000), and the Creative Nonfiction Foundation (\$5,000). In 2004, the NEA gave \$152,100 to eight groups. In 1999, however, eighteen local groups received \$623,500 from the NEA.

rom a dollar and cents standpoint, what is the economic impact of the arts locally?

Based on a 1998 survey, the arts community pumps \$170 million dollars directly into Allegheny County's economy.





n what day did the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette publish its first edition?

July 29, 1786. It was then known as the Pittsburgh Gazette. The paper was distributed around the Fort Pitt area.

hileus Fogg, Jules Verne's character from Around the World in Eighty Days (1873), was a slacker compared to an investigative journalist born in Apollo, PA. In 1889-90 she traveled the world in 72 days, 6 hours, 11 minutes and 14 seconds. Who was she?

Nellie Bly. Bly was born in Apollo in May, 1864. Her trip gave her worldwide fame. She started her newspaper career in Pittsburgh in 1885 and she died in 1922. She was born Elizabeth Cochran, but a newspaper editor suggested she take a pen name from a Stephen Foster song. The newspaper sponsoring her trip, The New York World, collected close to one million entries from readers trying to guess Bly's time.

nly one ocean liner has had Pittsburgh in its name. When did the USS Pittsburgh first sail?

The USS Pittsburgh started her maiden voyage June 6, 1922 traveling from Liverpool to Boston. In 1926, her name was changed to Pennland II. In April, 1941, she was sunk by German bombers.




hat company's hamburger made you "happy to be hungry"?

Winky's. In its advertising, Winky's also boasted there was no Winky's in Wilmerding. Winky's was in business between the mid 1960s and the mid 1980s.


"A w, dry up!" could be interpreted as an impertinent injunction or it could be the slogan for a Pittsburgh-based company that began in 1949. Name the company.

A tithe equator, the circumference of the earth is about 25,000 miles. Since it takes the earth 24 hours to make a complete revolution, that means at the equator the earth is spinning just over 1,000 miles per hour. How fast is the earth spinning at Pittsburgh's latitude, which is about 40 degrees north of the equator?

Someone standing at Pittsburgh's latitude would be traveling about 766 miles per hour. Locations of latitude further away from the equator move slower than 1,000 mph to make a revolution. To figure out the speed of the earth's rotation at Pittsburgh's latitude take the cosine of 40 degrees X 1,000.

ow many bridges are in Allegheny County?

There are about 1,058 bridges in Allegheny County that are at least 20 feet in length, although no one knows the exact number because of conflicting databases maintained by various government agencies. Whatever it is, it's a lot.

ow many people land and take off from the Pittsburgh International Airport?

In 2005, 10.4+ million passengers landed and took off from Pittsburgh International Airport; 59% were USAirways passengers and 6% were Southwest. In 2004, 13.3 million passengers either got on or got off airplanes at the airport. USAirways accounted for 76 percent of the passengers. In 1999, 19.6 million passengers got on or off airplanes, and US Airways had 87% of the business. Infinite Pittsburgh Trivia

the Bucs' general manager. The Pirates were the first team to wear the helmets in 1952. Prior to plastic helmets a player's only protection was the cloth cap. Muse died in 2005.

hich Pitt Panther basketball players have: The best career field goal percentage; the best career free throw percentage; the most career rebounds?

Best field goal percentage career: Brian Shorter (1988-91)— .538 percent. Best free throw percentage career: Sean Miller (1987-92)—.885 percent. Most career rebounds: am Clancy (1977-81)—1,342.

Washington & Jefferson College. It played the University of California to a scoreless tie, the only scoreless tie in Rose Bowl history. Washington & Jefferson played with only 11 men and no substitutes.

ow long did it take for Mario Lemieux to score his first NHL goal?



hy are all the fire hydrants within the city of Pittsburgh painted either red, yellow or green?

The colors indicate the size of the main waterlines that feed the hydrants. That way, firefighters know how much water pressure is at a hydrant. For example, green indicates a 24-inch line.

fter President Woodrow Wilson helped make the world safe for democracy in World War I, he and his attorney general, A. Mitchell Palmer, decided to keep the United States safe from communism. On January 2, 1920 the United States Department of Justice raided Communist party offices throughout America. Over 2,000 persons were arrested. How many were arrested in Pittsburgh?

There were 22 arrests made while a meeting was in progress on the third floor of the Communist Party of America district headquarters located at 1207 Fifth Avenue downtown. Russian literature and party membership cards were confiscated. Another 16 arrests were made in Youngstown, Ohio. The Wilson campaign against communism became known as the "Red Scare."

The Make-A-Wish Foundation of Western Pennsylvania grants wishes to children facing a life-threatening illness. When did Make- A-Wish make its first wish and what was it?

In May 1983, Make-A-Wish flew Bryan McClinton to Texas to visit his uncle because the uncle gave Bryan the best piggy-back ride. From 1983 to mid 2005, Make-A-Wish has granted nearly 7,000 wishes.

Over 900 million stickers.

n an average year, how many meals does the Lutheran Service Society of Western Pennsylvania's Meals on Wheels program distribute?

Meals on Wheels distributes about 1.2 million meals annually in Allegheny County. In the tri-state area, they pass out about 2.3 million meals a year.

ho was Pittsburgh's first millionaire?

John N. Ingham, in his book Making Iron and Steel says it was perhaps Curtis G. Hussey. Hussey was born in York, PA and started his professional career as a physician. He left his practice to open a general store in Western Pennsylvania where he also began dealing in pork. Eventually, he invested in a copper mine in the Lake Superior region and became a copper manufacturer. Ingham claims that Hussey was "perhaps" a millionaire by the time of the Civil War.

BUSINESS IN THE, BURGH

t one time, what did it mean to be "Westinghoused"?

It meant to be electrocuted. In the early 1900s, there was a debate over whether direct current (DC) or alternating current (AC) was the safer way to deliver electricity. Thomas Edison favored DC, Pittsburgher George Westinghouse favored AC. Edison came up with the term to describe the fate of someone who had been executed by the electric chair. Needless to say, the Pittsburgher won.



Beyond the BURGH

ow long is Altoona's horseshoe curve and what is it?

The semi-circle curve is about 1,400 feet across and its arc is nearly one mile long. It opened in 1854 and was built using picks, shovels and horses. The curve was built by the Pennsylvania Railroad.



The day was May 31, 1889. A 72 foot high, 930-foot dam broke about 24 miles from Johnstown, PA. At one point, the water hit a height of 76 feet. The death toll was 2,209. The dam, which was built in 1852, was in a state of disrepair even though some repairs had been made to it.
